In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. - John 1:4

Writing to the church from the start of the second century, the great church father Ireneaus observed that "the glory of God is a human being fully alive." As he wrote this, it helps to know that Irenaus was well known for writing against a strain of false teaching known as gnosticism, which often denied the body completely in favor of the spiritual, going even so far as to claiming that Jesus never truly came in the flesh. So the human being fully alive *must* also mean in the flesh, which also belies the importance of believing not just in the life eternal, but also the *resurrection of the body*. It is the body that *feels*, and when we too have felt fully alive, it is a feeling of great union between both body and soul - and each person has caught a glimpse of this life in its fullness in various ways.

Some of us have felt most alive at a ballgame, when the hope of victory that comes from a rousing rally stimulates all of the adrenaline in our body, and the roar of the crowd sweeps us up into something bigger than ourselves. I alluded to this feeling of excitement in last month's Timely Notes when talking about listening to Tom Hamilton call the drama of the Guardians games in the playoffs! Some of us feel this excitement at a concert, and when the music drops and we feel the bass in our bones. I felt this too when Tony Monaco and Scott Turner had the whole Milton Church rattling with the bass from the Hammond Organ. It is that moment of music when we eagerly await the building crescendo that heightens every sense to something more heavenly, like the vocal runs of Handel's Messiah. Then there are some of us find ourselves fully alive by free climbing el capitan, bungee jumping from tall bridges and jumping out of planes with parachutes. And by us, I mean maybe some of you ... because I don't know what you've been into in your younger years. All jokes aside, this desire and feeling has driven warriors caught in battle throughout the centuries, and those who participate in sports today. It is also what drives *both* love and lust. That is why this feeling can also be so deceptive when it is not rooted in an eternal faith. Then, the tragic reality of chasing this feeling hits hardest when people turn to substances and drugs to fill their minds with a new - and deceptive - experience of being alive. This artificial rush is often so powerful that it can be addicting. It almost always is - and so that thrill of feeling alive never quite reaches what is hoped for. Because feeling alive in all of its fullness is something that human beings really have sought since the beginning of our shared story.

As is true with every temporary yet powerful emotion of being and living, the problem is that we can be blinded by a manufactured feeling of life, and when we come down from it, we cannot see the narrow path that God has laid out for us. The reason for this is because when it is our own vision and feeling that we seek, we are limited to only the light that reaches our own eyes. That is why Irenaeus wrote not just that the glory of God is man fully alive, but that "The glory of God is man fully alive, and the life of man is the vision of God." Because it is God's story, and we are a part of it so long as we are in Jesus - and it is only Jesus who is fully alive. Just as Jesus taught us that the eyes are the lamp of the body, This vision of God in our story is the light of all mankind - and that light is also the word made flesh. The story made alive.

That is why it is such a blessing to remember that every Christmas, we celebrate Jesus' arrival not as a disembodied Spirit, but as the word made flesh. In him was life - and this life was the light of all mankind. And this light did not begin as a blinding light. It began as a small flame illuminating the darkness with a soft light so we can see in the dark. The birth of Christ and the light of God coming into the world is not immediately a great crescendo of victory. Instead, the Word made flesh came with the wordless cry of an infant that revealed the presence of God in the stillness of the night. It was the symbol of a small flame from a sing candle representing the most fragile and precious of all life: the new life that is on its way, ready for growth in all of its beauty and trial.

The new life of an infant.

The new life of being re-born in the Spirit.

And the new life glorified in this Spirit after our body returns to the Earth.

The human being fully alive in God's vision is part of the light eternal, and it is this hope of new life that illuminates our journey and brightens the dark nights and shortened days in this season that we enter. Being fully alive in Christ means not just the exhilarating feeling of ecstatic joy that comes and goes, but the purposeful peace and assurance of God's presence, and God's arrival to come. There are plenty of places in our scriptures that show us how Christ's arrival is dramatic indeed, pumping the adrenaline of life into all of our senses! And yet the Christmas story that we remember and celebrate, with all of its drama, is still at its core an intimate story of the still small light of new life. A singular life that would come to embrace, envelop, seal and save all of humankind. It is this person, and this new life that we celebrate. And our celebration gives a light to open the eyes of all of us who sit in the darkness of our old thoughts, our old bodies, and our old lives in favor of the new one to come. Amen.






