



Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

-John 3:14-16

In preparing for this last sermon series on *Who Killed Jesus*, it has been impossible to escape the shadow of the cross. If we are being honest, this is true whenever we gather for worship. The cross is prominently displayed at the front of the sanctuary for a reason, and looms over our communion table for a purpose. In Brian Zahnd's new book *The Wood Between the Worlds*, he explores the image of the cross and what it means. At the beginning of the book, he recalls a cartoon where "two space aliens who have just landed their flying saucer on Earth are standing in front of a life-sized crucifix, like the kind you can find along the roadsides in Spain. One alien says to the other, 'You know what we need to do? We need to get the [hell] out of here, that's what we need to do.' ... The cartoon may be somewhat profane, but it also alerts us to how shocking and unsettling a crucifix is when considered objectively. The aliens have concluded that a planet whose inhabitants erect public depictions of crucifixions is probably not a safe place—and they are not wrong."

I too have found myself wondering what certain signs in our world might mean to extraterrestrials visiting earth and how confusing that might seem — like the fact that our signs for a bathroom might be mistaken for a store that holds triangle people, rectangle people, or people who sit in circles. But this cartoon makes a perceptive observation, because it can also reflect our own. This world *isn't* a safe place, and the crucifix certainly *is* a strange thing to be part of a dominant cultural imagery in our world.

I will also admit to altering the original quote a tad, inserting the word *hell* in lieu of another curse word that I would normally never dream of writing in an article to the church. Yet I did not change the word to sanitize the joke. After all, Mr. Zahnd wanted to point out how our reaction to the jarring profanity in the joke is odd if not accompanied by the jarring imagery of the crucifix. Instead, I think the 'curse' word hell better fits. After all, when we say that we need to get the Hell out of here, this is the purpose of the cross, is it not? It is the instrument that God used to remove the curse of *hell* from our lives. It also prompts us to quickly leave the disturbing image of suffering behind in favor of our life in the *risen* Christ.

Protestants, of course, do not adorn their churches with the crucifix. Their cross is free of a body, so it can symbolize resurrection in a neatly clean and abstract way. Many non denominational churches do not even prominently display a cross in their churches, choosing instead to focus on God's Word and teaching and life ... and this is not necessarily a bad thing, but it *can* distract us from the raw power of Jesus' teaching that as the church, there will be a time when we too must carry the scorn and pain and discomfort of the cross. The very real purpose of the cross in the first place is an instrument of suffering - and one of very public suffering. This is the thing that we must confront when John speaks of the Son of Man being lifted up. In confronting the suffering that Christ endured—and the suffering that we too must endure when we are called to give our life to Christ—that we find ultimately joy and meaning and purpose in our lives as a part of the larger life we have recovered in God.

As the rhythm of my own life took me to Cleveland the other day, I visited Anita, who has been on our prayer list for some time. She has endured so much - and has been faithful through it all. She is currently downtown at the Cleveland Clinic. When I went to see her, I was quickly reminded that this hospital is consistently the busiest place I've experienced in Cleveland. It is filled with people who are enduring ailments and tests, and those who compassionately walk beside them and care for them. The experience of walking through a place where people of all races, classes, and creeds are gathered to be healed is immediately humbling. It can also be exasperating and depressing. That is, until we see Jesus in the midst of the people, and we know he is there, because that is where he often appeared in the gospels: among the throng of people crying out to be healed.

When we go through seasons where our prayer list lengthens like the shadows that are cast by the end of a day, the images of suffering that we see in the news, the struggles that we hear in the voice of those whom we love, and the pain that we experience and feel in our own bodies can all weigh very heavily upon our souls. This is especially true when others are enjoying the weather and the blessings of their lives. Yet as Christians and followers of the man who gave his life for ours, we do not turn away from this experience. We do not look away from the cross and the pain he bore - and we do not look away because we see not death, but life—and life eternal. Our hope and joy finds a greater place because in this love, we have found greater purpose in his Kingdom. We have looked upon our life in the eternal Life of God.

GOD ROCKS.

THERE IS NO ROCK LIKE OUR GOD

Try this fun summer craft that transforms rocks into beautiful waxy jewels! This craft can remind you that "there is no Rock like our God" (1 Samuel 2:2).

What you need:

- Smooth flat rocks
- Aluminum foil
- Oven mitt
- Newspapers
- Old crayons
- Cookie sheet
- Black permanent marker (optional)*
- An adult to help

What you do:

- 1. Clean off the rocks.
- 2. With an adult's help, set the oven to 225 degrees and bake your rocks for 15 minutes on a foil-lined cookie sheet.
- 3. While the rocks bake, remove the paper wrappers from the old crayons.
- 4. With an adult's help, use an oven mitt to remove the rocks from the stove and set them on a pad of newspapers. The rocks will be VERY HOT, so be careful!
- 5. Draw on the stones with the crayons. The heat will melt the crayons into vibrant liquid wax. For a swirl effect, hold each crayon against the rock in one place to create a puddle of color, and continue to swirl the color around with the end of the crayon.
- 6. *After the rock cools, use the marker to write "God Rocks," "The LORD is my Rock" or "My God is my Rock."
