Spread out above the heads of the living creatures was what looked something like a vault, sparkling like crystal, and awesome. - Ezekiel 1:22

During pre-school, each week my son Gus and his class were asked a question by their teacher. Later, she would share the answers with the parents. It was always quite fun to see the answers that some of the kids come up with, and if I'm being honest, a part of me also hoped that Gus will answer some of these questions in a way that reflected well on his parents! Vanity is hard to escape! It didn't always happen, but when he was asked what his favorite planet was, I was indeed pleased with his answer. He chose Earth!



It doesn't have the violent storms of Jupiter, the brilliant molten hot gas atmosphere of Venus, or the incredible red hue of Mars. I'm also glad that he didn't pick Uranus because some people often mispronounce this Greek word for the Heavens (and their name for the God of the universe) and find it funny. He picked Earth, and I would like to think so because it is the only planet with life in all of its rich complexity.

Earth is what astronomers refer to as a goldilocks planet. It is not too hot and not too cold, and its temperature is regulated by an atmosphere that also protects the planet from those wandering space rocks that can come hurtling down when caught in the planet's gravitational field. When God created the Heavens and the Earth, it is written in our scriptures that He created a dome, or vault, above the Earth, to separate the waters above from the waters below (Gn 1:6-8). This dome stretched over the expanse of the world. In his book on the Seven Pillars of Creation, my former professor Bill Brown wrote about how the Bible's hardened firmament and the Earth's protective atmosphere, though conceived quite differently, share the same function for life on earth: life sustaining protection.

In what is probably the craziest and most detailed vision of God in scripture, the prophet Ezekiel writes that spread out above the heads of the living creatures was what looked something like a vault, sparkling like crystal, and awesome. It is a vision I always read as something fantastic that could only be revealed in scripture, but as I looked over lake Michigan last week while away on vacation, I too witnessed this vault we are under sparkling like crystal. I saw the northern lights for the first time in my life. To the naked eye, the sky glowed with a faint green on the bottom, and large splotches of reddish purple near the thumbnail moon. Lines stretched across the sky, gently arching towards the apex of the sky above my head, and it was one of the first times that it looked like we were encapsulated in a dome, and I could see the grid-lines splitting from the top. It was even more brilliant when my mom took a picture of it.

In scientific terms, it was a result of the action of the magnetosphere that protects our planet from these excited electrons from beating upon us with their radiation. To my own eyes, it was also the revelation of God's majestic beauty and protection that has been afforded to all life on Earth. Just as the rainbow is a symbol of God's grace and covenant with all life on Earth, so I saw this sky is a sign of care and protection. At the same time, I was keenly aware of God's presence and why God appeared to Ezekiel in the first place. God came to warn, to prepare, and to do so with both hope and reproach. The people had turned away from God to follow their own way, and there is plenty of evidence of turmoil in our own world. As we turn on the news, we see God's children continue to make war with greed, violence and ambition. We see people trusting in their own power and protection rather than God's, and when we read our scripture, we read the same warning that is as relevant today as it was from the beginning: turn from sin and repent, or suffer the consequence.

Yet the final power of Ezekiel's message isn't in the stark warning. It is in the hope of redemption and resurrection. In this Word, we see God comes down to shepherd His people Himself (Ez 34). We see a valley of dry bones come together with living flesh and infused with the breath of life (Ez 37). We see God's temple is rebuilt, and living waters flow from that place to restore the banks of the dead sea, lush with life (Ez 47).

As the dark news of the world comes before us, don't look away. Pray with faith, and respond with what God has put on your heart—but as you do so, look outside to see this strange and beautiful planet of Earth bloom with life again, and remember God's promise of a new creation.


Acolytes Are Back


To accomplish this mission we will:



God's Creation

You can easily spot God's beautiful creation not just in majestic mountains and vast oceans but also in the smallest bits of nature. Try this fun activity at a park, in your backyard or on a hike.

What you need:

- Paper
- Pencils, pens or crayons
- Plastic cups or bowls

What you do:

- 1. Write out the same list of items for each player. One person can do this ahead of time, or the group can determine what to hunt for. Items must be small enough to fit in the container provided. Suggestions include: flower, grain of sand or dirt, seed, blade of grass, feather, small stick, pebble, insect (preferably alive), leaf, thorn, berry and so on.
- 2. Give a list and a cup (or bowl) to each player.
- 3. Designate a place to search for items, as well as a time limit (for example, look in the backyard for 15 minutes).
- 4. During the scavenger hunt, enjoy seeing the beauty of God's creation in the tiniest things. Players should cross off items when found.
- 5. When time is up, compare items. Point out similarities and differences. Discuss why these items are so amazing. Share Bible verses or stories about some items (for example, Isaiah 40:8 talks about grass and flowers, 1 Corinthians 10:4 talks about Jesus' being our rock, etc.).
