If you think you are standing firm, be careful that you don't fall! No temptation has overtaken you except what is common to mankind. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can endure it.

1 Corinthians 10:12-13

Some Christian traditions in our country have often taken issue with the celebration of *Halloween* as Americans celebrate it today. In the movie world, violent scary slasher flicks grace the big screen, or nowadays the big stream. People decorate their houses with all types of things to frighten, and the scary deeds of darkness seems to be celebrated with great fun.

I myself grew up in a household where it wasn't a big deal. We just had a lot of fun with it, and found it as a day to explore the neighborhood and collect lots of candy, so I don't personally have a problem with the spirit of the season. *However*, there is one aspect of the holiday that I've found to become more and more disturbing as I become older, wiser and theoretically more mature.

The other day, Andrea stopped into Target to get a few things, and she came back with a bag of Halloween candy. Since I cannot eat chocolate, she smiled and said 'I got these for you.' The bag contained Sour Patch Kids, Twizzlers, Twizzler Pull-n-Peels, and Jolly Rancher Lollipops. On the front of the bag is a yellow circle advertising that the bag contains '115 Pieces!'.

This was about two weeks ago, and over the course of those two weeks, the trashcan has frequently featured a cellophane film of empty wrappers on top of the other garbage beneath. At the time of this writing, there are considerably less than 115 pieces of candy in that bag. After all, it is hard to take just one. So, I open two, three, four ... maybe a few more ... and *this* is where my real problem with Halloween resides: in my desire to consume *all* of the candy before the hordes of miniature marauders, each one cleverly disguised in various ways, are unleashed upon the neighborhood searching for this source of great temptation. Why did Twizzlers decide to make the little Halloween packs 100 times better than their original candy?

The big bag resides on the shelf above our fridge, next to the healthy cookbooks, looming over the fresh vegetables and fruit and other things that I *should* be eating. It is all the more humiliating when I have to stand on my tippy-toes to reach the bag, but where there is a will (or a lack thereof), there is a way.

Walter Bagehot, former editor of *The Economist*, perceptively pointed out that 'It is good to be without vices, but it is not good to be without temptations.' When Jesus was led out into the desert to be tempted, it was a defining period of time that shaped his ministry to come, and strengthened his resolve the rest of the way. Without the temptation, he would not have been able to overcome it. After all, you cannot be fully human if you do not have temptations. At the same time, there is good reason that he taught us to pray that God *lead us not into temptation*. If you give in to temptation, you easily lose control and become a slave to something outside of yourself.

Some things are quite minor – like the candy on the top shelf, gently wooing me as effectively as any inanimate object could to *just go ahead and grab another piece*. Other things can swiftly destroy relationships and suffocate lives with betrayal, distrust, obsession, depression and an unhealthy dependence. Adultery, pornography, drugs, alcohol, entertainment, and a myriad of other escapes can quickly take precedence over everything else in our lives when addiction and sin takes root. Once the *bad* seed is planted, the weed can take root and grow into something that is quickly out of control and takes over your whole life.

The good news is that faith can do this exact same thing. With every great temptation, God has provided a way out. It is up to us to find it – and Jesus always gives us the way. The more that we can root out these temptations, the more room our faith has to grow. So today, I will not eat any Halloween candy ... and I will at least wait until the kids have had their fill.



## THANKSGIVING GATHERING




When you are with family and friends this holiday, let them know how thankful you are for them with this fun craft.

#### What you need:

- Photos (group or individual) of each person
- Ruler
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Envelopes
- Cardstock or construction paper
- · Glue sticks

#### What you do:

- 1. Collect photos of the people you'll be seeing. For group shots, make a copy for each person.
- 2. On the back of each picture, use a ruler and pencil to draw vertical and horizontal lines. Space the lines 1 inch apart to make a grid with 1-inch squares.
- 3. Starting in the top-right corner, number the squares beginning with 1. Number the top row across, then the second row and so on.
- 4. Cut out all the squares and put them in an envelope.
  Write the correct person's name on each envelope.
- 5. On the bottom of each piece of cardstock, write "I thank my God every time I remember you, Philippians 1:3 (NIV)."
  Then sign your name.
- Give each person an envelope and a piece of cardstock. Instruct people to put the squares in order to reveal their picture. Tell them how many numbers go across and down.
- 7. For a special keepsake, have people glue their finished photos onto the cardstock.
