Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things.

Philippians 4:6-8

I don't often seek the news, because I know that it will often be bad. After all, the bad, scary, and tragic parts of our world grab our attention because they bring our minds to think of ultimate things. In a world where our own death is often not confronted, when we read or hear or see about the death of others in the news, we cannot help but be transfixed by thinking about how something like this could happen.

Then there are times when tragedy comes into our own experience, and we receive news that hits home and affects our family. It is at these times where our feeling of despair may be the strongest, and any amount of planning or rhythm that we may have hoped for our lives is upended in anxiety and confusion.

Over the last two weeks, as I have been getting excited about the sermon series at church and exploring the question "Who Is Jesus?", I have received news that was not so good. In the world news, I read of the catastrophic earthquake in Morocco and the torrential flood overcome Libya, in addition to the ongoing war in Ukraine. I then heard that mine and Andrea's cousin Jamie in Pennsylvania was hospitalized from side effects of lymphoma treatment. Not long after this, I heard from a number of you with prayer requests involving family members who were in the hospital as well. As the prayers went up, many were faithfully answered as people returned home, until more news of hospitalizations came in. Then, the whole town received news of a homicide and suicide that happened here in Rittman. The victim of the homicide was someone who came down to The Server almost every day. He often came into The Server and talked about his neighbor who threatened him with a gun multiple times, but his life was looking up as he had met a woman at The Server who he started dating, he started work again and was getting ready to move to a new place, away from his neighbor who was dangerously mentally ill. He was killed by this neighbor.

This has been my personal experience over the last week, but I know that for some of you, these moments come more often than for others. Sometimes, these moments of pain or anxiety or confusion come with merciless frequency. When this happens, we can be prone to seek answers from almost anywhere. We look for physical things that change the way we feel or think, or we may seek distractions that allow us to escape from the realities that haunt us.

These may help or hurt, but ultimately our answer lay in the guidance of the Holy Spirit and God's Word in scripture. It is for this reason why the apostle Paul wrote this word of clarity and truth that began this pastor's note. It comes near the end of Paul's letter to the believers in Philippi. When he writes this letter, he sits in prison, yearning to see his church family once again.

It would have been very easy for the Apostle to look at his surroundings and see a cage trapping God's work in spreading the gospel through him. It would have been natural for him to wonder, over and over again in his mind, what he could have done differently to avoid this position where he was trapped. It would have been perfectly understandable to be overwhelmed by despair. Yet he wasn't. Instead, he instructs the faithful with very clear words how we might overcome the anxiety that our fallen world brings to our doorstep, waiting for us to stumble.

When the Apostle tells us *no to be anxious about anything,* the order may seem cheap at first. Commanding another to feel something different has rarely worked. It never has in my experience! Rather, it is the words that follow which gives us the power to actually fulfill this request, and it all starts with prayer. The ability to *remember what we have to be thankful for,* and then ask God for very specific and real help, even if it doesn't come in words, for the wordless groans of the Holy Spirit will also be heard (Romans 8:26). Then God's peace, which makes no worldly

This is then followed by the command to willfully turn our thoughts away from the bad news to the things that are good and pure and right. In other words, turning to the good news, because no amount of bad news can overcome the promises that God has set forth in scripture – that Jesus has prepared a place for you and gave his life so you may have an eternal one.

Thank God that the power of the Holy Spirit can express itself with such power to transcend any circumstance, for a mere cage would never be able to contain the *good* news. When we can't escape or turn away from the bad news – and most news seems to be bad news – we have to cling ever more fiercely, creatively, and faithfully to the *good* news found in the story of Jesus and what he has done for us.



GROWING UP FAST!


In September, Monarch butterflies migrate to warmer climates. In God's wonderful design, these butterflies have gone through an amazing transformation. This craft will remind you of the ongoing transformation that God has planned for you, too.

What you need:

- Clear, one-gallon zipper baggie (with no writing)
- Colored tissue paper
- Scissors
- Wooden, one-piece clothespin
- Pipe cleaner
- Black permanent marker
- Glue and wiggly eyes (optional)
- Magnet tape

What you do:

- 1. Turn the baggie inside out and rub it on your head to create static cling. Then turn the baggie right-side-out again.
- 2. Cut tissue paper into 2" x 2" squares.
- 3. Fill the baggie with tissue squares.
- 4. Press excess air out of the bag and zip it. Lay the baggie on its side (this will form the butterfly's wings) so the zipper is at the top.
- 5. Pinch the baggie with the clothespin so it divides the baggie into two equal parts to create the butterfly's head and body.
- 6. Thread the pipe cleaner through the hole atop the clothespin to form the antennae.
- With a permanent marker, write "Romans 12:2" on the bottom half of the clothespin.
- Draw on eyes (or glue on wiggly eyes).
- Attach a strip of magnet tape to the back of the clothespin. Then display the butterfly on your refrigerator.
